State of the Village

We are fortunate to live and work in one of the nation's finest Villages. Our schools are rated in the top 10 by GreatSchools.org and the Village was once ranked as a finalist by the National Civic League as an "All American City" and rated as one of the top 10 safest communities in New York State by Safewise.com, an independent organization using FBI statistics. We have a great story to tell and should be proud of our accomplishments!

Lynbrook's two biggest eyesores, the Capri Motel, and vacant Feather Building, have been addressed after many years of efforts. The Capri was demolished, and luxury apartments constructed for new residents. The Feather Building was demolished, and construction started several months ago, also for luxury housing. The new LIRR station platform reopened as well after negotiations with the LIRR President, shopping parking field #8 was expanded onto St. James Place, and the Lynbrook Diner reopened after discussions with the Village.

The Village has adjusted during the difficult times for many of our residents and businesses during the COVID-19 pandemic – "NY on Pause" and recovered nicely.

As everyone is aware, the COVID-19 pandemic presented challenges for the Village at a time when we were dealing with ways to optimize revenues and curtailing inflationary costs to provide needed services, as shared by all local governments and school districts in New York State. Nevertheless, the Village has complied with the

NYS Tax Cap in 2023.

However, stabilizing our Village budget of 50 million dollars is not a new issue facing Lynbrook.

Our Village has been focused on reducing non-essential services, maximizing efficiencies, and implementing good governance before COVID-19 caused the economy to turn downward in the first quarter of 2020. Our Trustees and I have had achieved, for example, a year where there was no tax increase, and attained an eight-year average of 2.3%.

During the Covid crisis, the economy also impacted many businesses in Lynbrook, but while some business close, other new businesses have opened. Downtown has experienced a shift from retail to service type industries. We project that the redevelopment of the 200-unit Feather Building on Broadway will increase Downtown foot traffic and the tax base with discretionary income wage earners to bolster local businesses.

Covid has affected several revenue sources which include loss of Building Permit fees, Parking Permit fees, and Court fines totaling over \$1.2 million. Federal interest rate reductions to support the economy in recovering from COVID resulted in a loss of \$650,000 in interest earnings for the Village. However, rising rates and the Village's prudent investing of idle funds in a local government investment pool and operating like a business quickly restored these earnings.

It is important to note that the pre-Covid

housing and mortgage crisis across the nation resulted in a multitude of boarded up houses in foreclosure, however Lynbrook was fortunately spared during that prior recession. Also, the Village is in a position where on 5 of 6 employee union contracts are settled, fixing the Village operational expenses over the long term.

The Village of Lynbrook fared better than many municipalities thanks to our excellent financial condition, and AA+ credit that has been affirmed, the highest it's been in half a century.

New York State establishes the maximum taxing power and debit limits for its municipalities. When compared to all other cities and villages in New York State, last year Lynbrook reached 62% of its constitutional tax limit, and has exhausted only 10% of its debt limit, making Lynbrook U.S.A. a relatively low taxed, low debt community. Approximately 22% of tax revenue is paid by Lynbrook Commercial property owners. Lynbrook has also received a classification of "No Fiscal Stress" from the NYS Comptroller for the past 6 consecutive years since the start of the program, scoring only a 13.3 on a 0-100 scale.

On another good note, we have closed the fiscal year with over an \$8.9 million surplus, which our auditors cited was attributed to good fiscal management.

Clearly, the bumpy economy has been our greatest challenge and will continue to challenge the Village of Lynbrook through 2024. Thankfully, 40-year record inflation levels have appeared to subside.

2024: A Vision for Tomorrow

Our accomplishments in 2023, and those of previous years, have put Lynbrook in a good position to thrive in 2024 in a tough economy.

The Mayor and Village Board have set forth goals and visions to continue our success into the New Year:

Atlantic Ave. Walkthrough: Acquisition of part of 29 Atlantic Ave to create a pedestrian walkthrough to Broadway.

Atlantic Avenue Vacant Stores: Owned by the MTA, promote

occupancy with desirable uses to serve the Community. **Downtown Kiosks:** Wayfinding Kiosks to promote local busi-

Downtown Kiosks: Wayfinding Kiosks to promote local businesses.

Downtown Master Plan: Preparation of long-term Plan

Feather Building: Substantial completion of construction of new upscale apartments.

Fire Department: We will seek bonding for replacing Fire Department equipment for our busy volunteers, who respond to 1,900 calls annually, to accommodate their office and safety training needs.

Library: Designation as a National Historic Landmark

Park Improvements: Review designs to construct welcoming gateway at Wilbur Street and Horton Avenue; Bleachers and concession, Wright Ave parking entrance.

Pool: New deck shade structure using \$75,000 Grant

Recycling: Efforts to reduce over \$1 million in disposal costs by making the disposing of certain recyclables in regular garbage simpler, to produce electricity.

Road Improvements: Rocklyn Ave and Devine Street repaving using NYS Grant.

Soccer Field: Improvements to Ocean Ave parking lot and play areas in time for summer.

Storefronts: Seek grants to improve storefronts

Street Cameras: Street Safety Intersection Cameras & Additional License Plate Readers: Received grant from Congressman Anthony D'Esposito for \$406,000.

Broadway Storefronts: Facelift from Community Block Grant.
